

Wesley Medical Center Pharmacy Residency PGY-2 Critical Care Residency Program

Purpose

The purpose of the Wesley Medical Center (WMC) PGY2 Critical Care Residency program is to develop highly skilled and knowledgeable critical care practitioners for patient care positions. Upon completion of the program, residents will be ready to apply their skills in direct patient care, exhibit excellent decision-making skills, and provide education and leadership in the care of patients in critical care.

Overview

The Wesley Medical Center Critical Care Residency Program is a one-year training program in an acute care, community hospital practice setting. We are recruiting for one (1) residency position for 2016-2017.

START date July 15

The program provides experience in a variety of settings, focusing on the core areas of practice specified in the ASHP Accreditation Standards. The program is flexible and provides residents with an opportunity to focus on areas of more specialized interest to them.

WMC is a tertiary-care, community teaching facility and Level 1 trauma center licensed for 760 beds and 102 bassinets. In 2004, WMC opened an 185,000 square foot critical care building. WMC contains The Children's Center, the only pediatric hospital in Kansas, which includes a Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. The emergency department is the largest in Kansas, treating over 65,000 patients from throughout Kansas and northern Oklahoma annually. WMC is a Joint Commission accredited Primary Stroke Center and Chest Pain Center. The medical facility is a training site for medical residents and students from the University of Kansas School of Medicine, as well as pharmacy students from several universities throughout the Midwest. The pharmacy department provides state-of-the-art clinical and distributive services to optimize the care of our patients.

Required Project: The resident must initiate and complete a clinical research or practice-related project, while adhering to an established timeline for the project to assure successful completion during the one-year residency. The project will be directly supervised by the preceptors who have expertise in the selected pharmacotherapy discipline. The project proposal must be approved by the Institutional Review Board or deemed Quality Improvement. The project will be presented at ASHP Midyear Meeting in December as well as the Midwest Pharmacy Residents Conference in Omaha, Nebraska, in May. Residents are also required to complete a publishable manuscript and are encouraged to publish results of the project in a peer-reviewed journal.

Candidate Qualifications:

- Doctor of Pharmacy degree from an ACPE-accredited College or School of Pharmacy or B.S in Pharmacy with equivalent clinical experience.
- PGY-1 residency from an ASHP accredited program
- Must be licensed as a pharmacist in Kansas or be eligible to reciprocate in Kansas.
- Must have, or be able to obtain, certification in BLS
